Every time our members call out, point out or expose a new hire's poor performance rather than helping them to get better....the Company WINS!! Every time our members continue to look at what's in it for me rather than what's best for us as a whole.....then the Company will continue to WIN!!!

As I sit here writing this letter we are 18 months from the end of this current Agreement and just about 12 months from beginning the process of preparing for the next set of negotiations. We as a membership have got to quit allowing the managers and supervisors to continue this "divide and conquer" mentality and join together as one membership fighting for the betterment of the whole rather than the improvement of the individuals. This has got to come from each and every member, senior, recalled or new hire. It has to be a personal want, a personal goal, and a personal belief that together we are more powerful than we are apart. The elected representatives in office today will be negotiating the next contract and the only negotiating power they will have comes from the strength and support that they receive from you, the Union.

Brothers and Sisters, make no mistake that I, for one, have had my fill of the Company's tactics and plan to make it my personal goal to fight back for the whole, meaning active, laid off and retired and I hope you will too.

2017 Hunting with Heroes at JSMC



For the last 9 years, a deer hunt has taken place in and around the JSMC property for disabled Veterans. The hunt, started with 9 hunters in 2008. The hunt, which was called The Ted Epple Hunt, named after a past JSMC Commander who loved hunting and supporting the project to help

disabled vets. The Co-chairs are Mike Couch and Mike Barns, who run the hunt on and around the JSMC property. Mike Couch and Mike Barns run The Ted Epple Hunt for the JSMC, but after teaming up with Hunting for Heroes with support from the SOS project, UAW, Labors union, private donations, and countless amount of volunteers, the numbers have grown to 49 hunters. Every hunter has a guide to stay with him or her during the hunt, and to sit with him in the blind. The guide's mission is to do whatever is needed to make their day a great day. It is about a 3 to 1 ratio; 1 hunter to 3 support people. In 2017, they took 28 deer. The hunting for all these hunters has now expanded to other areas including Kendrick Woods, Husky Refinery, and 3 others locations.

You might think you've had a bad day, or that you have it rough, until you spend some time with these men and women. You don't see the problems they go through everyday after serving our country.

One Disabled Veteran stated, "Fellowship is what I come for. Being in the woods and having a great time and talking to the people is what I like. Getting a deer is the icing on the cake." Vets have come from Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio, and Pennsylvania.

Two years ago, two vets came from the far eastern side of Pennsylvania. Pulling into the parking lot at JSMC, their truck muffler system was falling off. When they were done, they both were given deer and their truck was fixed at no cost to them. They left with the knowledge that people care about them. These stories go on and on. The bottom line is that we do remember and they are not forgotten. Making a difference for our disabled Veterans has been going on for nine years, and we will continue for many years into the future making a difference in our disabled Veterans lives for many years.
